Up-coming events

This month with the Tuesday evening meetings we have the first of our talks by an external speaker. Marcus Newton will be taking us on a (virtual) 'Tour Through 900 Years of Sheffield History'. Marcus is a (real) walking tour guide to Sheffield. His talk this month will take place in the Methodist Hall (the effect of the decoration being in the past we hope) at 8 pm on Tuesday 15th March. Later in the month Marcus will be leading an actual tour taking in the two Cathedrals of Sheffield. Kings Own Scottish Borders 1st Airborne Division

Died of wounds in the airborne landings at 'Arnhem' Holland, on September 22nd 1944. Only Bradwell lad to be killed in the 1939-45 War.

In this envelope are his personal belongings. Sent back to his parents in Bradwell, and when they died, handed on to me Eric Gill, as a friend of George before the War.

Forage Cap, Lanyard, photographs of George and his Grave at 'Arnhem', Mouth Organ, which he always had with him on his walks around Bradwell before the War and which was found in his Tunic Pocket when he died.

Life at the Manse 2004

Is there life at the manse? Certainly, since 16th August we have seen something in the region of sixty visitors, some friends from down south, some new friends welcoming us and some here on business delivering, reading the meter or come to see me on pastoral matters. On one level life in the manse is no different from our life before, we still have fun together as a family, we still row occasionally, and we share times of sadness together. On another level life is very different, now my office is in my home and people phone me up at all times of day and night, we never know whether the call will be a friend, a colleague or someone with a problem. We eat together, we watch television together, and even enjoy music together. We all agree that homework should be banned and that someone should invent an automatic room tidier. Does anyone know the box my best sweater is in? We found the hospital in Chesterfield at 10.30 pm one night after my daughter fell down stairs, she was fine, but needed to be checked over. We found the doctor and dentist when a sore face turned out to be a tooth infection and to-day we found a letter left by Geoffrey and Hazel Senior (previous minister and his wife) telling where all the local amenities are, someone had opened it and put it on a pile for future reference, we could have done with that over the last month.

Before anything else this is our home, it is where the four of us live and life is never anything but exciting. You are always welcome here, though we do prefer you to ring first, just to make sure we are in. As I close I want to thank the people of Bradwell for their very warm welcome, not just to me as Methodist Minister, but for the whole family, it is so good to walk down the Village and have many people stop and talk. Following the clearing of Doreen Andrew's house after her passing John Monahan received five Infant School log books dating from the late 19th C to the early 20th C. These were going to be difficult to store and catalogue by the Society and so John contacted the County Records Office in Matlock. He asked them whether they would take custody of the tomes and they responded in the affirmative. John then spoke to the two friendly men on the Mobile Library and they agreed to take the books to their HQ in Buxton from where they could be sent by the County Courier Service to Matlock. John has been assured of their safe arrival.
