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
## **Up-coming events**

## Service in the Second World War

Continuing the stories of Bradwell servicemen collected by Walter Rowland we find a newspaper cutting dated February 1946 about (Acting) Lieutenant Ralph Fielding Sanderson of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve (RNVR). In the 1939 data collected in the preparation for issuing rationing books we find that 22-year old Ralph was living in 1 Cross Lane Villas with his parents Charles and Violet and Violet's sister Lily Morton. Father Charles' occupation in the records for 1939 was stated to be a retired quarry engineer whilst Ralph was a Training College Student.

Ralph enlisted in the navy in August 1940 as an ordinary seaman. He was commissioned (Acting) Lieutenant in May 1942. He volunteered for mine disposal duties and served in the Admiralty section of Torpedo and Mining . He was probably based in Lowestoft at the Stone Frigate HMS *Europa* (as was Ron Wharton). Ralph was seconded away from Norfolk for three short periods during his service. In 1944 he was engaged upon work in the building of sections of the Mulberry Harbours. He was then posted to a group investigating unfamiliar underwater weapons. Finally in 1945 he was appointed as an instructor at the Royal Naval Bomb Disposal and Demolition School in what was then Cumberland. This was another Stone Frigate based at Holmbrook Hall (not far from Whitehaven) with the appropriate name of HMS *Volcano*.





Intriguingly 1 Cross Lane Villas also features in *After Seth* on p 247 in which is related. the arrival of 15-year old Dawn Herbert. She had been evacuated from Southend. Dawn went on to become one of the troupe of dancing girls known as the Bluebell Girls. The photograph below shows Dawn executing one of the high kicks for which the Girls were famous. The photograph was taken in 1951 when the troupe was appearing at 'The Lido' in Paris.

For the coming festive season we include the sheet music for 'Peace O'er the World' and a 1904 Christmas Card. Does anyone know who was 'H (Horace?) Middleton' the arranger of the music?



Carrying on with the Christmas theme: this Christmas Greetings card was sent by Walter Wood of Church Street to Marmaduke Eyre of Smalldale in 1904. In the 1911 census Walter is described as an auxiliary postman whilst Marmaduke and brother

William Eyre are both described as corn millers. It is notable that a card sent by a postman in Bradwell was franked in Sheffield at 8.15 pm on Christmas Eve and almost certainly was delivered in Smalldale (by Walter himself?) on Christmas Day.
