
As usual our meeting will take place in the Methodist Hall at 8 pm in the evening.

Our best selling publication was the reprint of The Jabez Bradwell Diary. This was sold from our stall on the field and by Cheryl in S & F Stores. The challenge to stick a pin in a map of the Isle of Man was greatly helped by the stewarding of Frank Cooper and his neighbour Alan. For this all 120 pins were sold at 2 pins for £1. The Bradwell resident chosen for the challenge who lived in Bradwell in the 1870's was Walter Graham the Primitive Methodist minister. Walter's previous ministry had been in the Isle of Man based in Castletown where the correct pin was stuck by one of our members who was Jill Salisbury. All together from the sales and our pin sticking challenge we raised £124.

Dr Houlbrook was another practitioner who was based there. He served the village in WWI before moving to Hathersage

shops on our Website – bradwellhistoricalsociety.org.uk) before moving the Netherside. The 'sons' were Cheetham and Jack who trained as joiners and Colin who concentrated on painting and decorating. Their main work at this workshop was as wheelwrights. Jack would tell me how two of them would walk to Peak Forest with a large chunk of wood for the wheel hub. The wood turner there would then set up the piece on the lathe while Jack and brother would go upstairs to the turning poles, they would then walk round the room pushing the machine arms, the turner would shout 'faster' as he got nearer to finishing the hub, requiring them to run. Then they walked back home to Bradwell.
