## **Up-coming events**

At the BHS committee meeting held in November the way forward for the future management of the Society by its elected committee was discussed in light of the present chair having indicated that he would not be standing for re-election in 2025. All of the members of the committee were present (except *ex officio* member, President Keith Hall) and separately indicated they would stand for re-election at the AGM. At the same time none of them was prepared to take on the full range of tasks that had gathered around the present chair over the years. It was suggested that in the future there should be two co-chairs who between them would take on the more formal roles of the Society such as introducing speakers and laying poppies etc. The role of the treasurer would remain as it is, as would the task of organizing refreshments. In order to reduce the amount of work falling on the secretary/chair someone from the committee would take on the paperwork for example the

preparation of agenda. A group would be set up in the committee to identify future speakers. The present chair would join the committee *ex officio* as editor of the Newsletter. At the AGM you will be able to comment on and it is to be hoped approve of this way forward and elect a committee to manage it.

As always Alan Eost, one of the area's leading organists, accompanied with his impeccable musicianship that delights the ear.

Nancie Salt was the musical director and is to be warmly congratulated on the high quality of this beautiful performance. Not content with merely giving us the magic of the 'Gloria", the choir and soloists then sang the Christmas music from Handel's 'Messiah' which proved another musical treat.

The concert concluded with a selection of glorious Christmas Carols to the delight of the audience who had travelled long distances to join the Hope Valley residents, for the musical feast. They were certainly not disappointed, judging by glowing comments as people departed into the cold December night.

It is an amazing fact that performances of this quality can be heard so often in the villages of the Hope Valley.
